NOTICE OF RELATED CASES

Pursuant to Local Rule 83-1.3.1, Plaintiffs Center for Biological Diversity, Central California Environmental Justice Network, Los Padres ForestWatch, National Parks Conservation Association, Natural Resources Defense Council, Patagonia Works, Sierra Club, and The Wilderness Society (collectively "Plaintiffs") file this notice to inform the Court and other parties that this case is related to *ForestWatch v. United States Bureau of Land Management*, No. CV-15-4378-MWF (JEMx) (C.D. Cal., filed June 10, 2015), assigned to the Honorable Judge Michael W. Fitzgerald.

The instant action is related to *ForestWatch* because both cases (a) arise from the same or closely related events, (b) call for determination of the same or substantially related or similar questions of law and fact, and (c) would entail substantial duplication of labor if heard by different judges. C.D. Cal. R. 83-1.3.1. Pursuant to Local Rule 83-1.3.1, satisfying any one of these criteria is enough for the cases to be related. Here, however, the cases satisfy all three criteria.

First, both cases arise from the same or closely related events. C.D. Cal. R. 83-1.3.1(a). In *ForestWatch*, plaintiffs Center for Biological Diversity and Los Padres ForestWatch successfully challenged the U.S. Bureau of Land Management's ("BLM's") Bakersfield Field Office's 2014 adoption of a resource management plan ("2014 RMP") and accompanying Final Environmental Impact Statement ("FEIS"). The 2014 RMP opened over 1 million acres of federal land and mineral estate to extensive oil and gas leasing and development, including through use of hydraulic fracturing or "fracking," a dangerous and polluting oil extraction technique whereby a mix of water, sand, and toxic chemicals is injected down an oil well under pressure to fracture the surrounding oil-bearing rock formation. Plaintiffs in *ForestWatch* brought suit under the National Environmental Policy Act ("NEPA"), claiming that BLM failed to analyze the impacts of fracking on the diverse and already vulnerable public resources in central California, including air quality, water, and wildlife. On

September 6, 2016, Judge Fitzgerald held in *ForestWatch* that BLM's FEIS failed to take a "hard look" at the impacts of fracking in the 2014 RMP, as NEPA requires. BLM agreed to prepare supplemental NEPA documentation to address the deficiencies identified by the Court and to issue a new decision document that will amend or supersede the existing record of decision.

On December 12, 2019, BLM issued its Record of Decision adopting a Supplemental Environmental Impact Statement ("SEIS") in purported compliance with Judge Fitzgerald's order in *ForestWatch*. The instant action now challenges the 2019 SEIS and BLM's continuing failure to take a "hard look" at the impacts of fracking in the SEIS. Center for Biological Diversity and Los Padres ForestWatch are plaintiffs in both cases and BLM is the principal defendant in both cases. Thus, both cases arise from the same or closely related events: BLM's failure to adequately examine the impacts of fracking in conjunction with its adoption of the 2014 RMP.

Second, both cases call for determination of the same or substantially related or similar questions of law and fact. C.D. Cal. R. 83-1.3.1(b). Both cases involve similar factual and legal inquiries into whether BLM complied with NEPA by taking a proper hard look at the impacts of fracking authorized in its 2014 RMP. BLM's flawed projections for oil and gas development and fracking in the planning area also underlie both cases. And both cases ultimately decide whether BLM can legally authorize expansive oil and gas activities, including fracking, on the land subject to the 2014 RMP.

Finally, the instant case would entail substantial duplication of labor if heard by a different judge. C.D. Cal. R. 83-1.3.1(c). Judge Fitzgerald and his court staff are already familiar with the issues in this case, including the detrimental impacts of fracking, the agency's obligations under NEPA, and the environmental analyses completed by BLM in the 2012 FEIS and 2014 RMP. Accordingly, assignment of this case to Judge Fitzgerald is appropriate under Local Rule 83-1.3.1 because it would
