Federal Defendants and Plaintiffs in these consolidated actions hereby move for a six-month stay of all proceedings. The motion is based on the following grounds:

- 1. The current scheduling order for these cases is at ECF No. 209 in the lead case's docket. That Order establishes a schedule for briefing the Parties' cross-motions for summary judgment. The next deadline under that schedule is for Federal Defendants' Cross-Motion for Summary Judgment and Opposition Brief, due July 13, 2021. In addition, Defendant-Intervenors filed a motion to dismiss on July 6, 2021 (ECF Nos. 210, 211; corrected and filed separately in the consolidated case on July 7, 2021 (ECF No. 212; ECF Nos. 186, 187 (Case No. 4:17-cv-00042-BMM))), and responses to that motion are due July 27, by operation of D. Mont. L.R. 7.1(d)(1)(B)(i). Federal Defendants and Plaintiffs seek a stay of all proceedings, including the deadlines pertaining to each of these pending motions.
- 2. Federal Defendants previously moved to stay proceedings for 90 days following the Department of the Interior's revocation of Secretarial Order 3348 (the "Zinke Order"). Plaintiffs opposed the motion and this Court denied it. *See*

ECF No. 206.

- 3. Following additional conferral, Federal Defendants and Plaintiffs in both actions have agreed that a six-month stay of proceedings would facilitate the orderly course of justice without prejudicing Plaintiffs' interests, due to progress Federal Defendants have made in reviewing the federal coal leasing program and the significant amount of advance notice Federal Defendants have agreed to give plaintiffs of any impending decision to approve a coal lease sale or coal lease modification.
- 4. Secretary Debra Haaland issued Secretarial Order 3398 (the "Haaland Oder") on April 16, 2021. Among other things, the Haaland Order revoked the Zinke Order and directed "[t]he Department [to] review and revise as necessary all policies and instructions that implemented the . . . revoked SOs" That review process is ongoing.
- 5. Interior has inherent authority to reconsider and to revise, replace, or repeal the Zinke Order, and to revisit the policies articulated therein. *See FCC v. Fox Television Stations, Inc.*, 556 U.S. 502, 515 (2009) (discussing agency's inherent ability to change position). The Federal Defendants believe that where, as here, an agency has already begun the process of reconsidering its own action by revoking it and taking concrete steps to develop replacement policy, proceeding with litigation risks wasting both the parties' and the court's resources.

- 6. It is the Federal Defendants' position that continuing to litigate these cases would interfere with Interior's ongoing administrative process by forcing it to redirect resources from its reconsideration process to litigation and to structure its administrative process around pending litigation, rather than the agency's priorities and expertise. *See Thompson v. U.S. Dep't of Labor*, 885 F.2d 551, 558 (9th Cir. 1989) ("The Supreme Court has warned courts not to intrude on administrative functions.").
- 7. Plaintiffs agree that a stay is warranted at this time given the Federal Defendants' progress toward developing a replacement for the challenged coalleasing policy. However, Plaintiffs reserve their right to seek an end to the abeyance or to oppose any request to extend the abeyance in the event additional progress is significantly delayed.
- 8. Federal Defendants and Plaintiffs agree that a six-month stay would not prejudice Plaintiffs' interests. Federal Defendants have committed to notify Plaintiffs well in advance in the event BLM intends to issue a decision, supported by a National Environmental Policy Act analysis, authorizing a coal lease sale or coal lease modification. Following any such notice, Federal Defendants would agree not to oppose any request by Plaintiffs to end the stay, and Federal Defendants would further agree to file their summary judgment response brief no later than 14 days after the stay is lifted (unless otherwise ordered by the court or

agreed to by the Plaintiffs and Federal Defendants).

- 9. Counsel for Federal Defendants and the Plaintiffs have conferred with counsel for Intervenor-Defendants in these consolidated cases. Intervenor-Defendants National Mining Association, the State of Wyoming, and the State of Montana have indicated that they take no position on this motion.
 - 10. A proposed order accompanies this motion.
